

### **Tolle Lege – take up and read (From St. Augustine): Spiritual Reading**

A great spiritual writer Dom Eugene Boylan, a Cistercian monk, says in his book, *Difficulties in Mental Prayer*, that **Jesus grows in our souls**. Imagine! (Dom Eugene was involved in the splitting of the atom in Vienna before becoming a monk!). If Jesus grows in my soul then spiritual reading is the growth agent.

Some books of value out there.....

### **Man's Search for Meaning: Viktor E. Frankl**

This is an extraordinary little book about the life of the author in various concentration camps and how he even found meaning, understanding, forgiveness and love in this milieu of death. In the end he established a renowned school of psychotherapy or logotherapy, a way of curing the ills of our souls through finding meaning in life. Quoting Nietzsche often he says, **“He who has a why to live for can bear almost any How.”**

### **The Impact of God: Iain Matthew**

This book will lead you to pray. It speaks to you as you are, with your searching and struggles in faith. In it he distils the writings of St. John of the Cross and makes them accessible and relevant for modern-day living. An opening line says it all: “John of the cross speaks to people who feel unable to change.” He also deals with the darkness which enveloped John and our own darkness also. Regardless of how we feel there is always that deepest desire within all “to see the face of God and to rest in God’s abode.” (Hymn of Morning Prayer, Weeks 1 & 3 in the Breviary)

### **Radcliffe, Timothy: Take the Plunge**

While this is not in the strictly spiritual genre, in other words a book you could use as a basis for Lectio Divina, it is most insightful on Baptism and Confirmation. In fact, your heart will warm within you as you savour his insights of the importance of these two sacraments in our lives. Pope John Paul said that the most important day of his life, was the day he was baptized. Radcliffe writes in such a user-friendly and familiar style that the reader’s appetite is continually whetted as he/she anticipates the insights of ensuing chapters.

### **Divine Renovation: From a Maintenance to a Missional Parish: Fr. James Mallon**

For anyone interested in parish renewal and revival this indeed is a must-read. In chapter Two he presents the core message of Pope Francis to young people in Rio de Janeiro:

“What do I expect as a consequence of Youth Day? I expect a mess.... there will be a mess here in Rio? There will be! But I want a mess in the dioceses! I want people to go out! I want the church to go out on the street! I want the church to go out to the street! I want us to defend ourselves against everything that is worldliness, that is installation, that is comfortableness, that is clericalism, that is being shut-in in ourselves. The parishes, the schools, the institutions, exist to go out!

This book is indeed also a practical manual on how to renew and renovate a parish and how to move it from a maintenance to a missionary model.

### **Haunted by Christ: Richard Harries**

This is a classic, presenting authors familiar to us and their struggle for faith. Among the authors he presents are Samuel Beckett, Emily Dickinson and Dostoevsky. However, one could start with W.H.Auden with the title line from his poem, “Bless what there is for Being” (The Precious Five, celebrating the five senses.)

I’m sure there are books you would also like to include in any further discussion. How wonderful it would be if there were a Spirituality Book Club in the parish as so many are already reading spirituality. ### **Silence in Church**

Those of you who go to the cinema, the theatre, musicals, art galleries or revered places of worship will readily admit that they insist on absolute silence.

Those who have been to Lourdes or Rue du Bac WILL REMEMBER HOW SILENT THEIR SACRED SPACES ARE – THE *SANCTUAIRE* IS TRULY SACROSANCT IN TERMS OF silence.

In Westminster cathedral one is gently reminded that silence is the norm.

Our church is a sanctuary for God upon earth – we have the sanctuary lamp positioned right beside the tabernacle to remind us that here that God was made flesh and dwells among us. Many times parishioners try to pray alone with the Alone after Mass or before Mass. The noise level must be a great distraction to them. We also need to model good practice for children and young adults.

At a school assembly one cannot but be impressed by how three hundred children can enter the Assembly hall in absolute silence and maintain that silence for a half an hour and more.

**A Yellow card, and perhaps a red one – “And the priests are the worst culprits of all.”**

About a year ago a very responsible parishioner drew my attention to the amount of talking in church and just as I was trying to take all this on board, the parishioner added, “and the priests are the worst culprits of all” – kindly reprimand us if we are disturbing the sacred silence of our sanctuaries.

Silence is potent; in silence I can sometimes be closer to my neighbour in my heart; I don’t always have to use words; in silence I am alone with the Alone; in silence the Holy Spirit will offer a solution for my problems; in silence I am in touch with all things eternal. Finally, in silence heart speaks to heart in prayer.

## Cafod

Thank you for your generosity to the Lent Family Fast Day that totalled **£853.52**. It means that the Mahinur's family and community in Bangladesh can receive the help they need. We will be able to fund training in new farming skills, provide hardy seeds that will grow despite salty floodwater or droughts and give chicken and ducks for families to breed and sell. We will also teach trades like mechanics and tailoring so people are not reliant on farming in unpredictable weather. 1,403 people have been taught how to adapt farming methods, 17 sites have been identified for new community vegetable, 233 fruit trees have been planted in schools and 27 nurses and community health workers have been trained to spot malnutrition. We have reached 4,293 people in Zimbabwe and are on track to reach 239,000 across Zimbabwe, Eritrea and Zambia by the end of 2021. Thank you
